

Macon Money ~ Area/Code

A city-wide social game bringing together residents in the city of Macon, GA, using a real-world local currency designed to address the issue of segregation. Tens of thousands of US dollars' worth of *Macon Money* has been printed up and to earn this currency players cash in 'bonds' that have been distributed to residents of Macon. The catch is that each player gets just half a bond and to turn it in must find a person holding a matching half.
